It's a place.


A sanctuary for those who've learned

The Yuba Sutter Amateur Radio Club, Inc. meets every second Tuesday of each month at the Red Cross building on Garden Hiway, Yuba City at 7:30 p.m. The board of directors meets the Wednesday before, same place, same time. All members and guests are invited to attend. The club holds a net on the local repeater every Monday night 146.685 at 7:30 p.m.

PLANNED DISASTER: If all goes well, a disaster, of killing and major proportions, will strike Sutter County September 15, at about 10 a.m.

A train will derail at the Garden Highway Industrial Park near the Y.C. sewage treatment plant. A tank car of mysterious, but lethal content will leak, an explosive-laden flat car will erupt in flames and scores will lie injured, dying, while authorities evacuate others.

No one will really be hurt, however, since the disaster is only a mock in the annual training exercise testing the training and readiness of Sutter and Yuba county disaster response systems.

All local hospitals will participate along with the CHP, area fire departments, emergency service offices, ambulances, amateur radio, REACT and Beale AFB.

Some 75 volunteers will be decorated as disaster victims and scattered about the calamity scene.

Howard N6CCS, is the chief of the Amateur Radio group. He needs volunteers to cover the hospitals in the area. If anyone can spend a couple of hours on the morning of Sept. 15 and pass messages at one of the four stations, please give him a call. It is fun to do and gives us practice so that when a real emergency comes along, we will know what to do. Antennas have been installed at all area hospitals for 2 meter use in case of an emergency.


