**DID YOU KNOW?**--Last year the FCC issued 5660 new amateur radio callsigns to Californians who obtained new or upgraded operator licenses. The breakdown is 3744 Novice, 1133 Technician/General, 538 Advanced, and 245 Extra. Amateurs change signs about 20% of the time when they upgrade. If the 1982 licensing rate holds constant in 1983, the following callsign milestones

Novices will start being issued KB6--- prefixes callsigns about April. Technician/General callsigns will cycle to the end of the N6J-- sequence by 1984. When all N6 prefixed calls are issued, the old W6--- ones will be the next group. Advanced callsigns will cycle toward the end of the KJ6-- sequence by 1984. No KG4--, KG6R-, KG6S-, or KH6-- callsigns will be issued to mainlanders.

Extra callsigns will cycle about half way thru the NZ6- sequence by 1984. The next sequence will be WA6-.
