SOAPBOX--ITCHES AND GRIPES--SOAPBOX

I am concerned about the number of unattended, automatic digital stations on the high frequency bands. Their operation under special temporary authorizations from the FCC has proven that they tend to interfere with stations operating nearby, because they begin transmitting regardless of the ongoing contacts in progress. While the FCC STA under which these unattended HF packet stations operate did not (could not) grant exclusive operating privileges on the authorized frequencies, the STA operators have adopted that attitude. A common practice among SSTV operators on 20 meters is to interfere with any SSB station trying to use an empty SSTV calling frequency, and HF Packet takes it one step further - they start up regardless of the operations in progress--but being unattended, they are not even aware of the interference caused. If they could publish their operating schedule and leave time for others to use the frequencies, it would be a lot easier to accommodate their operations.

In each instance when I have reported the interference they cause, either the station contacted fails to acknowledge the report, or he replies with a snotty, holier-than-thou rude-gram.

Unattended HF packet may have something going for it. It does free the owner-operator of such a station to pursue other activities while his computer controlled station sends countless messages countless places. (It does not follow that all these messages need to be sent or should have been sent in the first place--many BBS sysops are filtering them out entirely.)

When a local VHF BBS handles incoming/outgoing traffic on one of

a few planned VHF frequencies, we all benefit. But on HF, the available spectrum is too limited to grant exclusive or primary operating privileges to so few people for so little benefit. When these people aren't even present during their station's operation, it doesn't strike me as fair or even desirable to continue the experiment. If robot operation is in the future of ham radio on the HF bands, the concept needs to be fully explored. Just because something "can" be done doesn't mean it has to be done.

Recently, ARRL moved to get a rule change to allow this activity to be codified on the HF bands. It smacks of railroading, given the unresponsiveness of the STA operators to reports of interference they create. Why can't this concept be examined in the light of day?

We read with some misgiving Ron's contribution this month. We have heard others voice the same complaint about interference with the ARRL Bulletins by the unattended stations on Packet. It seems to your Editor that either

the Packet station or ARRL should be able to move slightly and take care of the problem. What's really disturbing is the apparent attitude of the Packet Operators involved. These people seem to go berserk when someone questions their operation. There is apparently no room in their world for compromise or tolerance of the other guy.

Many years ago, there was a problem of this sort on 75 meters between the Mobileers in the San Francisco area on 3995 KHz and a weekly Civil Defense Net on 3992 KHz. This was in AM days, and it was recognized that selectivity of the mobile receivers was not the best. Even so, the actions by some of the people involved was as bad or worse than that being experienced in the Packet thing. There was no room for compromise or "give and take" on the part of some of the mobileers. The result was high-powered fixed stations attempting to wipe out the CD Nets, and there was bad feeling all around. Strangely, the thing apparently died a slow death. I don't remember any lasting effects; so cooler heads apparently finally prevailed and the problem became manageable. Let's hope the Packet thing is resolved in something approaching this manner.

Since there was no Board meeting during the December Holidays, there are no Meeting Minutes this month. We promise to have a suitable report next issue.




