EMCOMM 2001

The second annual EMCOMM (EMergency COMMunication) 2001 was again held in Palo Cedro, CA. (Hwy 44 just east of Redding, CA.) On March 31, 2001. I also attended the first EMCOMM last July 22nd.

The purpose of EMCOMM is to bring together state agencies such as OES, local, county and state law enforcement with the Ham community such as ARES and RACES and provide training in the event of an emergency or disaster.

Jerry Boyd, K6BZ, the Sacramento Valley Section Manager spearheads the event and offers

quite a bit of expertise and knowledge on emergency management through his book When The Big One Hits...A Survival Guide For Amateur Radio Operators. Dave Thorne, K6SOJ, the SV SEC, North; Assistant ACS Officer, MAR III, California OES, gave instruction on how to handle emergencies and disasters using the ICS (the Incident Command System). He also gave a great talk on the "Psychology of Disaster".

OES brought some of their equipment to EMCOMM. They brought a 4 wheel drive vehicle pulling a trailer which supported the huge crank-up uplink satellite dish. Also featured were two communications vehicles; one standard size van loaded with every kind of two-way radio imaginable and second was the large walk-in van which also had tons of radio equipment and enough room to hold a small meeting around a mini-conference table. The Sheriff's Department brought their van loaded with radios as well as other emergency equipment. The highlight of the display was a special visit by the new north state CHP helicopter. A French-made machine, it supports an 800 hp. engine with a cable hoist, infra-red radar and every radio imaginable. It has proved to be a valuable tool in search and rescue, especially when dealing with the unique weather problems in and around Mount Shasta.

I hope that each and everyone of you will have the ability to attend next year's EMCOMM. I'll keep you posted!



CURT'S CONNECTOR CORNER

Welcome to the second installment of the Connector Corner. Today we'll talk briefly about coax connectors. These are the type we most commonly use for connections to antennas.

Information for this article was taken from the *ARRL Handbook for Radio Amateurs 2001* (CD), chapter 22. There are three families of connectors used for RF - BNC, UHF and Type N. The UHF connector is mostly used for HF frequencies. It's nomenclature for the male connector is PL-259 and the female is SO-239. Figure 1 shows the proper way to build a connection using a PL-259. These connectors are used with RG-8 and RG-11 size coaxial cable and are designed to handle the full power of amateur radio operations. For more detailed information refer to *ARRL Handbook for Radio Amateurs 2001*, pages 22-9 and 22-10.

I was 12 years old and mowing lawns on the north end of Percy Avenue to earn money for model airplanes and fishing tackle from Bill Ledford's Sport Shop on Percy Avenue, just north of Franklin Avenue. Now it's a beauty shop. Bill Ledford's mom (Maudie) was NR6A's grandmother. June's (my XYL) youngest sister married a grandson of one of Cy's sister-in-law's... (second-shirt-tail?)








Inside the OES Communication Van




Another View of the OES Van
