US ARDF CHAMPIONSHIPS AT SOUTH LAKE TAHOE

So there I was, on a peaceful Saturday morning, sitting peacefully in my camp chair, high above Lake Tahoe. Suddenly there was the commotion of a human body flailing through the brush. This person was in a hurry, and I had been waiting hours for him to arrive. He was only the first of 22 competitors to come my way.

On Saturday, September 14, 2007, the U.S. Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) competition got underway with 30 competitors attempting to find five transmitters in the shortest possible time. The course was shaped roughly like a pork chop, in fairly thick brushy, forested terrain at Camp Concord near South Lake Tahoe. Some transmitters were as close as 700 meters, others about 1600 meters apart.

Imagine a track meet cross country event over



broken terrain with all the forest wildlife present, (we did encounter a bear), and thirty competitors carrying radios and antennas, charging around trying to find the transmitting stations, and do it before someone else. If you have that image, you have a decent idea of how ARDF operates.

You have to be in decent physical condition, and know your equipment capabilities and limitations. I was serving as a race marshal at transmitter number 3.

You can see in the photo at the left the basic equipment. First the competitor dressed for brush crashing, equipped with a finger mounted RFID stick on his right hand in which he also grasps a map board depicting the local terrain. In his left hand he carries a three element 2 meter yagi to which is attached a radio receiver and an attenuator. By listening to the correct one minute transmission, he can zero in on the transmitter and eventually find it. Once in the immediate vicinity, perhaps 30 yards, he or she can see it clearly marked by a flag mounted just off the ground. The RFID stick is inserted into a time clock-like device, and the competitor races off to find the next transmitter. There is no time for celebration, no arms thrust in the air, no joyous shouts of triumph. He or she must get on with it, find the next transmitter or the finish line. It all has to be done in three hours. This competitor is Jay Hennigan, WB6RDV, of Goleta, CA.

My own participation as race marshal was limited to photography during the actual run. Once the three-hour period was up, I took the transmitting station apart and returned all materials to Camp Concord's dining hall. (Did I mention it was all up

Saturday night we enjoyed a nice tri-tip
supper and an awards ceremony. I got to help hand
out the awards for the 2-meter competition.



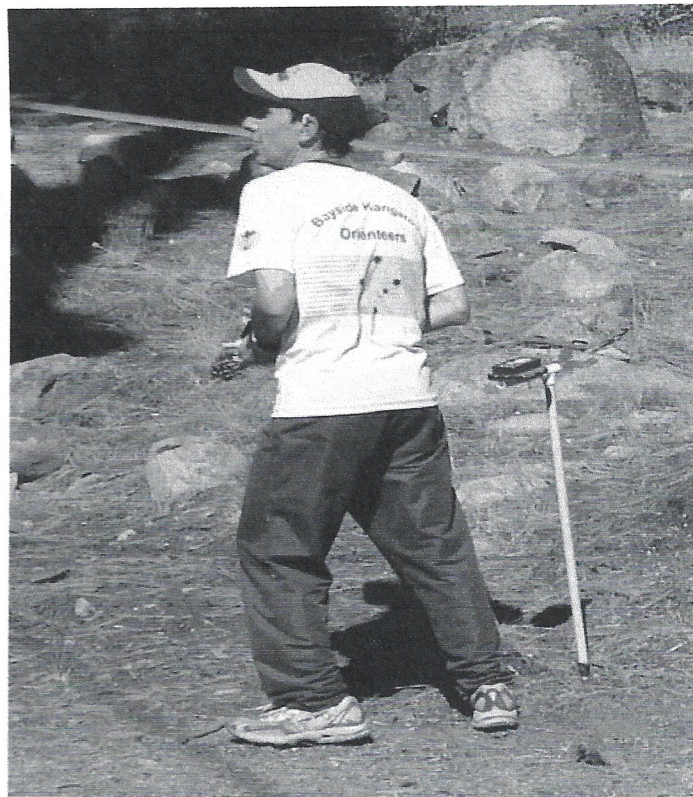
The striped ribbons are all attached to medals
for the US competitors, and the solid purple ribbons
(and medals) are awarded to the international
competitors. On Sunday, the first finisher was Brian
Ackerly, VK3YNG. Sunday was a repeat of the
exercise of Saturday, but the transmitters and
equipment were all on 80 meters. DF loops were
carried and used by competitors in this event, and
yes, the receivers had to be 80 meter capable.

Santa Barbara Amateur Radio Club (BARC)
and the Los Angeles Orienteering Club (LAOC)
sponsored the competition. Marvin Johnston,
KE6HTS, was the meet director (or chairman), Joe
Moell, K0OV, handled publicity, and Bob Cooley,
KF6VSE, was the course setter.

Due to airline reservations, and a late start
resulting from transmitter glitches, many competitors
on Sunday had to finish the event and get on the road.
I cannot say how the awards were handed out on
Sunday, as I also had to leave. But I can tell you that
this group of radio enthusiasts is skilled and able. If
you think you can pull one over on them by hiding a
transmitter, think again. I believe they would find it.

EDITOR'S RAMBLINGS

The last week has been a busy one for the old dad. It was decided that the old RG8X cable to the Windom and Tri Band Beam might hiccup at higher power from the new amplifier. We are in the process

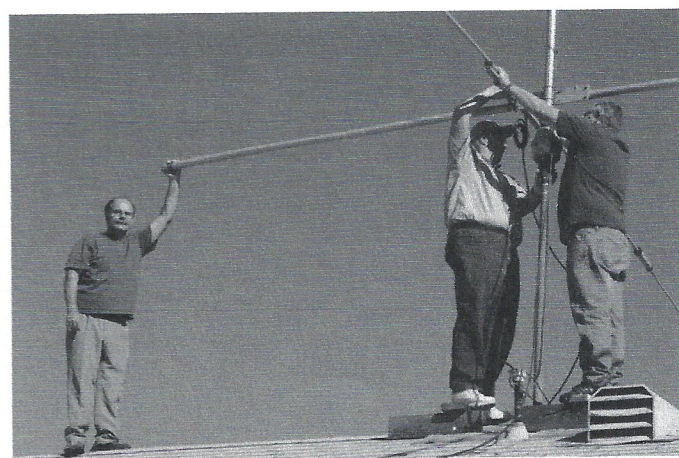
of going from 100 watts to about 600 watts max, so some revamping of the station was in order.

It is indeed an experience trying to procure RG213 or equivalent cable these days with the price of copper sky high. I finally bought a 500-foot reel of heavy duty cable and some good connectors. The plan was to replace all the existing cable and add a 6-meter atop the old tribander. I also built a 6-meter J pole antenna for use on the repeaters in the area.

That's when the trouble started. Once again, Murphy reigned supreme, and there were problems with the J Pole. It would match with a short half wave cable on it, but put the cable into the shack, and the analyzer went crazy. The J Pole still is not installed, and more work will be required. That's a project for a later day.

I am deeply indebted to several club members for two days on the roof and the overcoming of a bunch of obstacles. This when all the material and tools were available before we started. The 6-meter installation is still acting strangely, and I think it is related to cable length. The Windom and 10-15-20 meter beam works as before, and all is well with them. 6 meters is another matter. The frequency is higher, and things are somewhat more critical as to matching, cable length and other aspects of the system.

The idea behind all this is to be able work the California QSO Party with a little more power than the 100 watts out of the 756 PRO III. I believe that objective has been accomplished, but that's as far as we go at present. We'll report on the results next month. Below are some pictures of the roof crew at work. Again, I am indebted to the roof crew, as I fall down on a flat ground, let alone on a sloping roof.

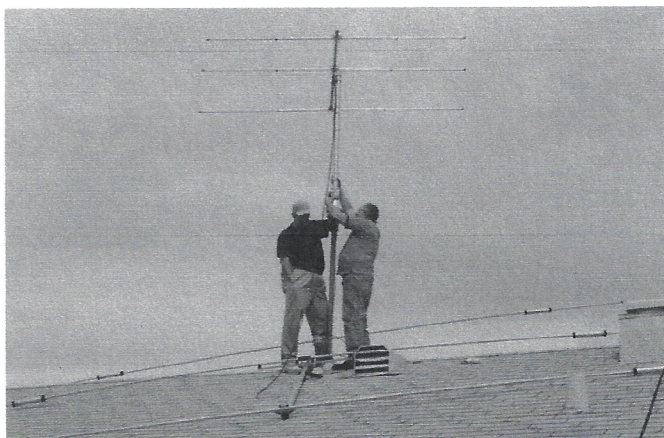
